
Update on print and internet outreach.

Those of you who are familiar with the Caballito congregation may know that Internet and Let's Start Talking are the two major ways our congregation finds new persons with whom to study the Bible.

When missionaries arrived in Buenos Aires in the 1970s a major area of our evangelistic outreach was through Bible correspondence courses. With the paradigm shift to internet the same material in slightly adapted form is available on our website, <u>www.cursos.iglesiadecristo.org.ar</u>

Much of this material is still also available in printed form at our church building. This month we added a poster to our windows to encourage people to stop and ask about the "*Introduction to the message of the Bible*" course. Please pray we can surface more walk in and internet contacts to invite to study God's word, and to events at church, so that they can eventually become part of God's people.

I've noticed that over the years a number of people have signed up for the internet courses after doing on line searches in Spanish for "Bible study" and related terms. However, over the last year or so enrollments have dropped tremendously. Even advertising for the on-line course hasn't brought in students! Does this

According to one of our major newspapers, *La Nación*, Argentina is even more saturated with internet connectivity than other major Latin American countries like Brazil and Mexico. So, if this is the way people come into contact with ideas, we have to use it to share God's word.

For these reasons, we've decided to revamp the course and website. A local web designer is working with us to make it more attractive. We're

Please notice that my part of the "we" in this process is largely finding trained people who can help in this area. For example, a free lance programmer, Gabriel Ferrarese, is in charge of keeping the online side going and worry free. He's a member of the church from the province of Córdoba.
