October 18 was graduation day for our 6th graders and also, for the first time, our kindergarteners. This is my first year to complete a school year here at Nueva Vida, and it has

been amazing to look back on the changes of so many of my kids this year. I'd like to share with you a few highlights of the 2013 school year:

1. Griselda and Joel are two children with Down Syndrome, ages 10 and 11. At the beginning of the school year, they both could say about 2 or 3 words. They now can say approximately 10-15 words. Griselda is so proud when she goes around greeting everyone with her new word "HOLA." This may not seem like a big accomplishment, but for children who have never been able to talk, this is a big deal! 2. Joseph said his first word ever this year at the age of 4. He continues to make progress, although slow, and his mother is faithful in bringing him.

3. The deaf children at our school have made great gains in their sign language this year. All of the teachers, along with our sign language teachers, have made a concerted effort to help these children, and it really shows. I love watching them having conversations between each other and playing together at recess.

4. Laura received her "flipper" dental apparatus. It has given her more confidence, and she is making some rapid gains in speech therapy.

To God be the glory for all these successes. I am so thankful to be a part of His plan for each one of my children. Thank you for making these successes possible!!

This is not to say that our children are not loved by their families, but sometimes, because of the hard life that they live, many children do not get to experience just being kids!
